Gredda came to SCARS the same way we get many dogs. We received a phone call about an injured dog that needed help. We soon realized that Gredda was more than injured, her emaciated state and paralyzed condition were a horror. Yet Gredda was a happy, sweet dog that readily approached people with both of her back legs dragging behind.

It has been a year since we rescued Gredda. She is one of the most amazing dogs. Her spirit and her personality are hard to describe in mere words. She has come from the most horrific situation, but she takes her disability in stride and even makes it work to her advantage. You know she wants your attention when you've been Achilles' tendon raked by her wheel chair. She slows down for no one — man, beast or obstacle. It's been a true pleasure and inspiration to get to know Gredda.

As we know, all good things come to an end. Recently Gredda was diagnosed with cancer. She has both operable lumps and inoperable. Working with the vets to decide what's best for her and fair to put her through is gut wrenching and the worst part of rescue, or life in general to be honest. But neither Gredda nor I are ones to wallow in self pity. So after a few days of crying, we decided to make her last weeks to months as amazing as possible. She gets a new toy every day. I cook her an omelette every day. We go for walks in the river valley and we are going to make her a ball pool. But I sat with my kids and we all agreed that's not enough, not for Gredda. So we made a bucket list.

- **Toys.** Gredda is a master de-squeaker and loves toys that can give her a challenge. We asked our supporters to donate durable squeaker toys. We were overwhelmed with donations!
- **Herding.** Gredda loves to chase. Herding is accomplished with Gredda under full CONTROL so no one gets hurt. But she loves to bark and have things run from her while I keep her close. As of the publication of this newsletter, we hadn't gone herding, but we are hopeful it will happen.
- **Swimming.** Gredda loves swimming! We are grateful to Wendy and Drew Watson for letting her swim in their pool. She has a blast.



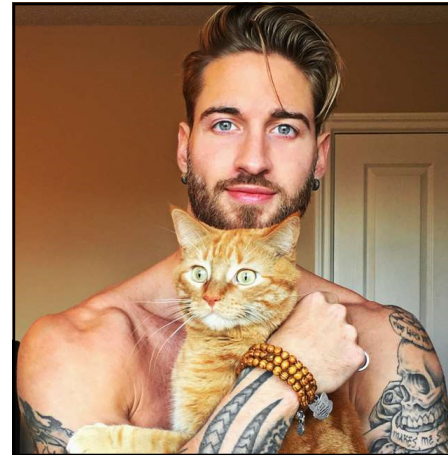

Rescue Stories

Meeet Maxine. She came to SCARS on October 14 from our friends at the Canine Action Project. Her injuries are difficult to describe. They shocked even our most senior front line volunteers. In fact, we chose not to share the photos taken at the emergency vet clinic after her wounds were initially cleaned and abraded. The skin from much of her hind end was destroyed. She also had bite wounds all over her head and body. Best guess is she was attacked by a pack of dogs or coyotes. What we know for sure is that without veterinary care, these wounds would have resulted in a slow, painful death. Thankfully we were able to get her to emergency care at the Guardian Veterinary Centre in Edmonton. Because a severe infection had not yet set in, the vet team felt she had a good chance to fully recover.

SCARS volunteer transported her to the Westlock Veterinary Centre on October 21 where she continued to receive care until she was ready to move to a SCARS foster home. We are very grateful to the veterinary teams and transport drivers that are helping Maxine. SCARS remains hopeful that she will make a 100% recovery.



Maxine has a strong will to survive. Her life is important to her and she deserved our help. Thanks to reconstructive surgery, the gaps in her skin are able to close. A

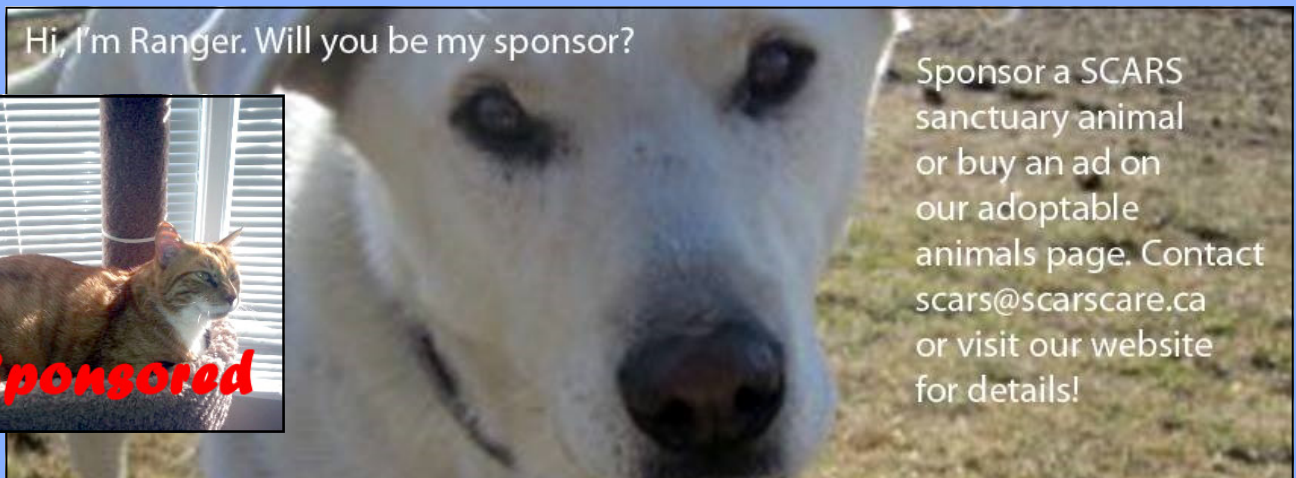

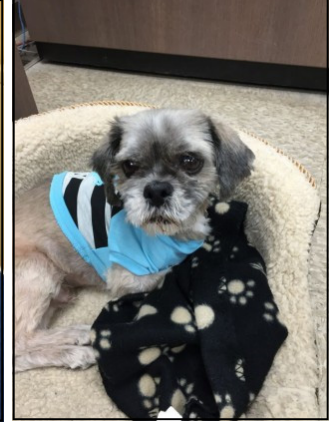
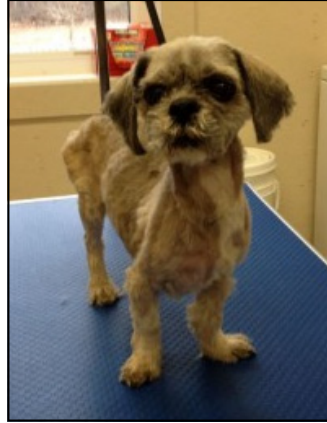

Sparky

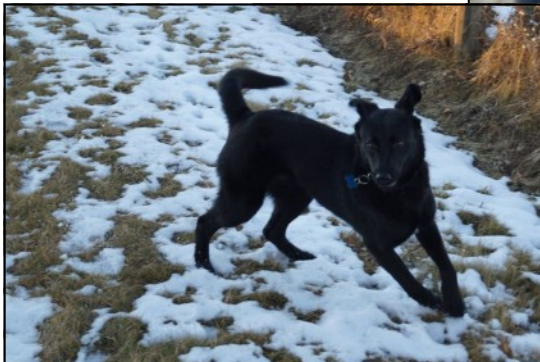
Sparky was found in a garage, curled up in a corner as if he were looking for a peaceful place to spend his final hours. Thankfully, the home owner noticed him before it was too late. Sparky was taken to the local animal control facility and thankfully that facility has a relationship with SCARS. Instead of being euthanized like just another unwanted senior dog, he was transferred to SCARS. Little Sparky is estimated to be 10-12 years old. His coat was a mess, he was thin and weak, and his teeth were in terrible condition. His blood work told a sad tale. His kidney enzymes were high and his white blood cells were through the roof. He was dehydrated and his blood sugar was low. But he was in good spirits and eagerly ate and drank – all good signs. Sparky was groomed, vet checked and now we are determining next steps to get him well again. He deserves to spend his retirement years loved and in comfort. We are grateful to the Municipal District of Lac La Biche for developing a partnership with SCARS. When they can't return a dog to its owner or rehome it, they reach out to us. That means dogs like Sparky can get a second chance. Teamwork saves lives. We are glad to help dogs like Sparky.

Now SCARS will find me a forever home! I am a black diamond in the rough that is ready to shine. I will be the most dedicated and loyal fan a dog owner could ever have.



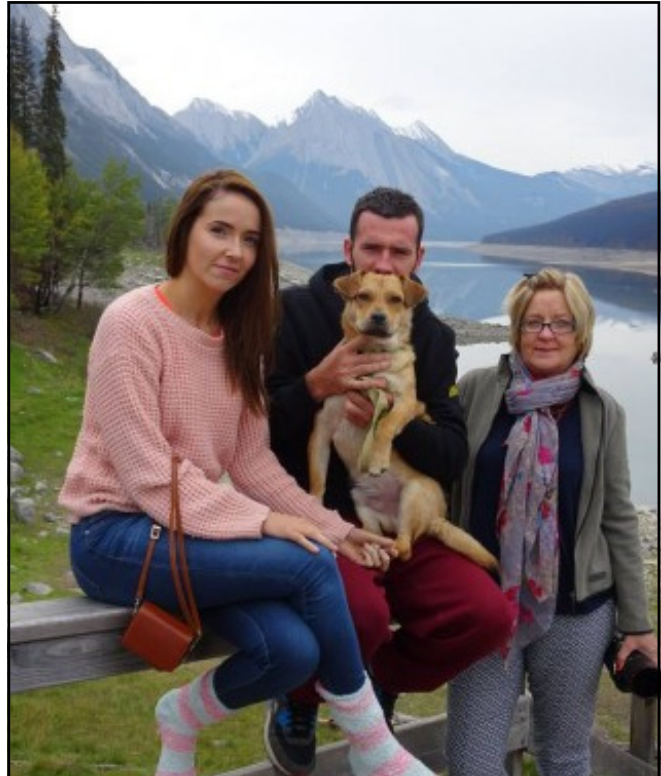
Look At Me Now

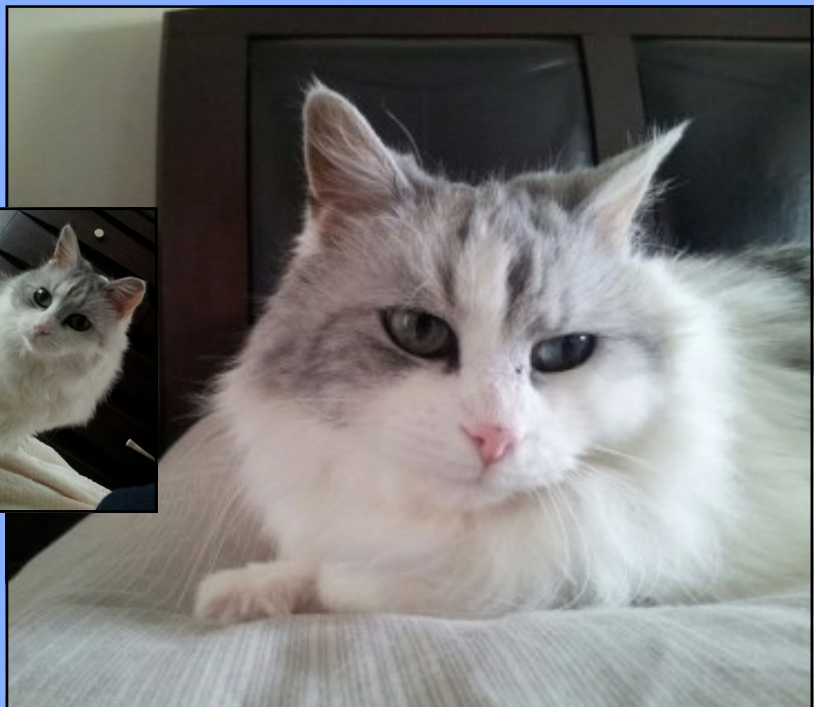
Lilly (formerly Princess)

She was very apprehensive and nervous when I first picked her up; but since then she is doing great, and has made herself right at home.

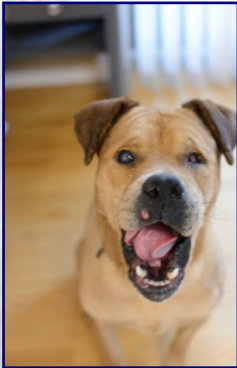
She is such a beautiful girl and her fur has come back really nicely. I still cannot believe that someone gave her up and she was so close to being put down because she was so shy.

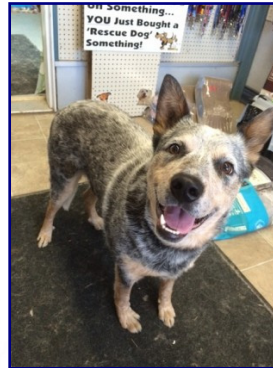

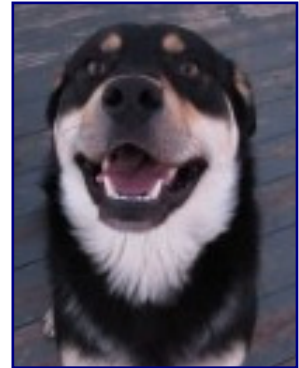

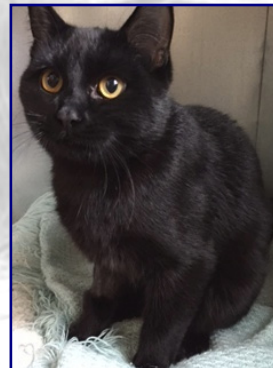

These little ones will not experience that terrible fate. SCARS will help hundreds more dogs, puppies, cats and kittens before spring 2016 finally arrives. Pups like these are why we exist and why our volunteers work so hard 365 days of the year.

dogs from suffering. Our ambitious goal is an Alberta where all dogs and cats have safe, loving homes. Many of the communities we serve lack basic animal services. The result is pet overpopulation that leads to animal abandonment, disease, injury and suffering. SCARS is a network of caring individuals who believe no animal should suffer or go homeless. It's not just the animals that benefit. SCARS helps communities become safer and healthier, especially for children. We develop partnerships with rural communities and provide adoption services through our foster system. A fine example of our involvement is the relationship we enjoy with our event sponsor, the County of Lac La Biche. SCARS has accepted many dogs from the county pound over the years, found them homes and provided medical care. We are most grateful for the County's generous contribution to the cost of this event. They, along with other sponsors, made this event and our rescue efforts, possible.

In the last twelve months alone SCARS has found homes for just over 900 animals. We have provided pet care and education, and we have completed families through pet adoptions. We believe in getting to the root of the pet overpopulation problem through promoting spay and neuter. All SCARS adoption fees include spaying or neutering, initial vaccinations and microchips, as well as any required medical treatments. Our costs well exceed our modest adoption fees. It is for that reason that events like C&C are critical to our ability to carry on our work. We are truly grateful to our volunteers, corporate and individual donors, rescue group partners, and the participating veterinary clinics who work closely with us. We know there is much left to do. At this moment, there are still thousands of homeless dogs and cats waiting for our help. They are scared and confused. They are hungry, sick and injured. They are sitting in

An Informed Dog Owner is a Dog's Best Friend

Being an informed dog owner means being a dog's best friend. Being uninformed can mean a life of misery, even death for MAN'S best friend.

For years, there has been an alarming number of abandoned, surrendered, and euthanized pets in this country. The reasons for this tragic phenomenon are many, and none of them are a mystery. But the greatest contributing factor is the failure of too many potential dog owners to educate themselves fully BEFORE they become pet parents.

The educated ones would know to thoroughly familiarize themselves with the breed they're considering, including the breed's physical description and personality; trainability and exercise requirements; health issues, and general care and grooming. They would know there's no such thing as TOO much information. The more informed they are, the more informed their decision will be.

They would know to choose a breed that fits in with their particular lifestyle, needs and expectations. Examples? No high-shedding dogs in a home of allergy sufferers. No hyperactive, high-energy dogs in a small apartment. No dogs that can't get along with cats or other family pets. No dogs in need of constant companionship if no one is home during the day.

They would know that, whatever the breed, raising a dog from puppyhood is, like raising a child, a fulltime responsibility.

They would know that puppies must be housetrained promptly and socialized early in order for them to develop into well-behaved and friendly dogs with good bite inhibition.

They would know to always be consistent, that discipline does NOT mean punishment, and that love, in and of itself, does NOT conquer all.

They would also know that certified trainers and supervised puppy classes can be of crucial assistance to them in raising calm and balanced dogs if they can't manage on their own.

The flipside of this are the UNinformed and the UNeducated. The ones who, ruled by their hearts and not their heads, choose poorly from the start. The ones who, sadly and all too frequently, raise dogs that are untrained, ill-mannered and often dangerous.

These are the dogs who, over time, will prove too much for their ill-equipped and increasingly frustrated owners to handle. These are the dogs who will ultimately be abandoned in empty lots or left by the side of the road. These are the dogs who will be desposited in secret outside a local pound or shelter or, if they're lucky, surrendered in person to a rescue organization.

These are the dogs who will be adopted – and probably returned – by unsuspecting people intent on doing the right thing by not buying one from a pet store or an unscrupulous breeder. These are the dogs who, more than likely, will be euthanized due to overcrowding or because of their own people-biting or dog-aggressive behaviors.

These are the unfortunate innocents who will pay with their lives for their owners' unfortunate ignorance. Thereby perpetuating an all-too-familiar and vicious cycle. And the only way to break this cycle is to turn every potential pet parent into an educated pet parent. Ignorance never was, nor ever will be, an acceptable excuse.

Walls for Winter Update

The warm fall weather has been perfect for the SCARS' Walls for Winter Shelter Program.

Through donations and grants, SCARS provides the materials to our construction partner to build doghouse modules. Each house is totally insulated and consists of four wall pieces, a raised floor, a rubber coated roof, corner trim and an interior wind wall divider. The units are made by the wonderful people at Alberta Job Corps and then assembled on-site in rural communities.

Recently a crew of four, handy SCARS volunteers put in a very long day of driving, delivering and assembling. They provided 15 houses to lucky dogs and their families. They left three other houses to be available in the community.

Thank you to volunteers Alyson Prince, Jen Tcachuk, Marcus Leebody and Scott Heatcoat. A special thank you to volunteer and community liaison Bev Young.

Walls for Winter is a program where SCARS provides insulated dog houses and straw to families in rural communities that otherwise would not be able to provide warm shelter for their pets. As part of this program, we also provide spay-neuter-return of pets.

To make this program successful, we need builders, supplies and drivers:

How to help:

- Donate shelter building supplies or gift cards to stores that sell building supplies
- Become a corporate sponsor
- Become a delivery driver. We need volunteers to help us deliver the shelters. We also need drivers to assist with our spay-neuter-return (SNR) program. This is a commitment of six plus hours and we especially need people who are available during working hours Monday to Friday.

SNR is where we drive owned pets to one of our veterinary partners to be spayed or neutered. The pets spend one or more days recovering at the clinic and then we return them to their homes.

Our goal is to prevent unwanted litters and enhance the well-being of owned pets. Because we help reduce the overall population of unwanted pets, we also enhance the safety and wellness of people in the community.

Second Chance Animal Rescue Society (SCARS) is a non-profit, registered charitable organization dedicated to reducing the number of homeless animals in northern Alberta, Canada. Since 2002, SCARS has rescued, rehabilitated and rehomed thousands of companion animals.

Our mission is to promote the humane care and protection of all animals and to prevent cruelty and suffering. We provide veterinary care and foster homes until permanent homes are found. Our foster homes provide animals with warm shelter, food, exercise and tender loving care—something that so many of these animals have never experienced. We also promote responsible pet ownership, the importance of spaying and neutering, and community awareness. We rely solely on money raised through memberships, donations, grants, sponsorships and other fundraising efforts. Here are some ways you can help:
