Trex was chained and left to freeze

hortly before Christmas 2016 on a day when the temperatures were quickly dropping, SCARS was asked to help an abandoned "mean" dog that had been chained to a door step. The photo provided to us by text caused our volunteers to scramble. One look and we knew this dog might not survive the night. The two-hour road trip to the location was started immediately.

We indeed discovered an emaciated, dehydrated dog, chained to a doorstep, standing in his own filth without shelter or protection. With a little coaxing and patience, the poor starving boy safely went into a crate and began his journey with SCARS. At the veterinary assessment, we discovered he scored a one on the body condition evaluation. A scale of 1-9 is used by vets and enforcement officers to scale the condition of animals brought in from abuse cases.

That night the temperature dropped to -30 Celsius and the vet assured us he would not have survived. The chain was wrapped tightly around his neck and had been there long enough to discolor his fur. Every rib and bone stuck out. You could not only count his vertebrae, you could see the formation of them. We rarely see dogs in this condition that survive. Trex needed a few weeks of multiple small feedings with digestive formula. For any being, human or otherwise that has suffered starvation (especially for as long as Trex did), too much food at once can cause stomach issues, including torsion and blockage. Needless to say, Trex was happy for every kibble he received.

He has now recovered tremendously. In a few weeks he went from this scrawny half form of a dog to a sizable, sturdy boy who parades happily around the yard. He has made many friends. Trex is good with dogs, NOT good with cats and needs a proper introduction to people. If you offer him a treat, he will quickly become your friend. Trex loves vehicle rides and has great house manners, but does like to counter surf.

Trex will be looking for a home with a confident, experienced owner (older children only). He needs someone willing to continue helping him overcome his past so he can fully realize the good boy he wants to be.

Preventing Unwanted Pets through SNR

pay-Neuter-Return (SNR) is a program where we provide spay/neuter of owned pets in rural communities that have pet overpopulation. We transport the pets to our veterinary partner to be spayed or neutered, they spend one or more days recovering at the clinic and then we return them home. Our goal is to enhance the health and wellness of community pets. Because we help reduce the number of unwanted pets, we also enhance the safety and wellness of people in the community. Our program includes providing pets with a shelter and straw foinsulation.

How to HELP:




NEW VOLUNTEER ORIENTATIONS

Walls for Winter Program Update

etween September and December 2016, 71 dog houses, 10 cat houses and one cat condo (fits about 10 cats) were delivered to pet owners who participated in our spay-neuter-return program.

For outdoor pets, the arrival of snow means fewer or no options for a warm, dry place to sleep or seek shelter from a storm. Shelters give pets much deserved comfort and a better chance for survival through the bitterness of winter.

A lot of effort and love goes into every shelter, and many people are involved in the process from design to delivery. The largest dog shelters are approximately 100 pounds each. We make three sizes for dogs as well as a version for cats. All are insulated and filled with straw for extra warmth.

We are grateful to:

- Details Insulation and Bobby Franklin's team for spraying foam insulation into the bases of our shelters, creating the best warmth spot right under the pet's belly where they generate most of their body heat. They insulated 10 houses and 30 bases in early November and 30 more bases in January. SCARS donated some of these houses to Zoe's Animal Rescue for delivery to their target community west of Edmonton.
- Deloitte LLP for allowing their staff time away from work on Friday, October 7 to put together our pre-fabricated shelters as part of their annual "community impact day."

- Hole's Greenhouse in St. Albert for loaning us space at their Enjoy Centre for the Deloitte's shelter build day.
- Moe Duval of Duval Transport for transporting the assembled dog shelters to the communities.
- Alberta Job Corp for building pet shelters for SCARS year round. They provide us with at least 10 every month.
- All the compassionate SCARS volunteers who donate their time so generously.

Here is what Moe said about one of his experiences delivering shelters...

"I am feeling emotionally mixed up. I had the opportunity to participate in delivering free dog and cat houses yesterday. The SCARS volunteers (Sylvia, Trish, Alyson and many others) knew what they were doing and often referred to residents and their pets by name. They knew which pet gave birth to which puppies and where they lived. They talked to the residents about their free spay/neuter program, dropped off houses for pets that have already participated and collected homeless pets. One of the homeless dogs had given birth to four beautiful little puppies a week ago. They were laying on a sheet of plywood out in the open, curled up in a ball to stay warm. I learned so much about SCARS and what they do to help homeless pets and assist pet owners. It's truly awesome."

What We Do and How to Help

econd Chance Animal Rescue Society (SCARS) is a non-profit, registered charitable organization (Reg. no. 863478467RR0001) that is dedicated to reducing the number of abandoned animals in Alberta. Since 2002, SCARS has rescued, rehabilitated and rehomed thousands of homeless cat and dogs, and we have helped communities become safer and healthier.

Our mission is to promote the humane care and protection of all animals and to prevent cruelty and suffering. We take in as many animals as our resources allow. We typically have over 200 in care and rehome 1,000 plus each year. The animals live with our volunteers who get to know them and begin the training process in a positive environment. For dogs, it includes crate training, leash training, house training, and more. We provide our volunteers with training and ongoing support. This helps us match pets to families that are suitable to the pet's needs and the needs of the adoptive family. All pets are spayed/neutered, vaccinated and microchipped and provided with whatever veterinary or behavioural care they need. Our adopters can return pets to us for any reason for the life of that pet. Once a SCARS pet, always a SCARS pet.

In addition to our rescue efforts, we provide education, spay and neuter, and resources like pet shelters to families in rural communities where poverty and lack of pet services can lead to animal neglect. Our goal is to reduce the number of unwanted pets and help people who own pets provide adequate care. Stray animals can create health and safety risks to people (especially children), but happy, healthy owned pets bond with their families and contribute positively to their community. Here are some ways you can help:

Donate or sponsor—our veterinary expenses are enormous. Please consider donating to our rescue efforts. When you donate online, you get a tax receipt by email the same day.


